



## 2026 Master Brewers Conference - Abstract Submission Guide

### Abstract Requirements

All abstracts should adhere to the following guidelines:

**Length** - 300 words

**Structure** - Authors are encouraged to structure abstracts using the following components:

1. **Title** – Clear, concise, and reflective of the content
2. **Background / Purpose (Why)** – Why the work matters. Briefly explain the context and purpose of the work.
3. **Methods / Evidence Review (How)** – How the work/evidence was conducted or reviewed. Describe the methods, approach, or guidelines used.
4. **Key Findings / Lessons (So What?)**– Summarize the primary results, insights, or lessons learned.
5. **Implications / Conclusion (Now What?)** – Why this work is important and what others can take away.

### Formatting

- Written in **plain language** where possible
- No charts, tables, or images
- Limit jargon and spell out acronyms on first use

### Submission Requirements

- **Submitter's name, email, and role** (Presenting Author, Organizer, Co-Author, Proposed Speaker)
- **Author organizations, job title, and credentials**
- **Additional authors (name, job title, email, role, organization, and credentials)**
- **Submission Category**
  - Focus Session (30-45 minutes)
  - Brewtech Session (10-minute paid technology demonstration)
  - Post-Meeting Workshop / Field Trip
  - Abstract (20-min Oral presentation abstract, Poster session abstract, or Either)
- **3-5 Topic Keywords** (examples include sanitation, yeast management, brewing fundamentals, etc)
- **Was this abstract submitted on behalf of an MBAA District or Committee?**
- **Was this abstract previously published or presented? If yes, where?**



## Eligibility

- Work may be in progress, but must have **clear preliminary insights**
- Submissions must be the author's **original work**

## Abstract Scoring Rubric

Each abstract is scored on a **1–5 scale** in each category (1 = weak, 5 = exceptional).

Total possible score: **25 points**.

| <b>3. Practical Implementation / Innovation</b>  | Practical implications meaningful to audience; unique perspectives, creative approaches, or new findings       | 1–5    |
| <b>4. Quality of Approach &amp; Findings</b>     | Strength of methods, depth of analysis, credibility of findings, insights, or lessons learned                  | 1–5    |
| <b>5. Significance / Potential Impact</b>        | Importance of the work, implications for practical application or research, usefulness to attendees            | 1–5    |
| <b>Reviewer Comments:</b>                        | Overall thoughts and recommendations.  | N/A    |

## Reviewer Rating Guide (1–5 scale)

**5 – Exceptional:** Clear, compelling, highly aligned; innovative; strong methodology or powerful insights; very high relevance.

**4 – Strong:** Well-written, meaningful contribution with solid approach; minor areas for improvement.

**3 – Adequate:** Meets baseline quality; relevance is present but not strong; approach or clarity could be improved.

**2 – Weak:** Unclear focus, insufficient detail, questionable relevance.

**1 – Poor:** Does not meet minimum requirements; not aligned with themes; unclear or incomplete.
